Each year the Pleasantville Clergy Association hosts an Interfaith Thanksgiving Service. As we now prepare for Chanukah – our winter holiday of miracle and light - I thought I would share the brief teaching I brought to last week's Thanksgiving gathering:

In the Jewish lectionary, the scriptural reading for this week - in synagogues all over the world - is Parashat "Vayeitze" (Genesis 28: 10 - 32: 3). It begins:

10 Jacob left Beer-sheba, and set out for Haran. 11 He came upon a certain place and stopped there for the night, for the sun had set. Taking one of the stones of that place, he put it under his head and lay down in that place. 12 He had a dream; a stairway was set on the ground and its top reached to the sky, and angels of God were going up and down on it. 13 And HaShem was standing beside him and said, "I am HaShem, the God of your father Abraham and the God of Isaac: the ground on which you are lying I will assign to you and to your offspring. 14 Your descendants shall be as the dust of the earth; you shall spread out to the west and to the east, to the north and to the south. All the families of the earth shall bless themselves by you and your descendants. 15 Remember, I am with you: I will protect you wherever you go and will bring you back to this land. I will not leave you until I have done what I have promised you." 16 Jacob awoke from his sleep and said, "Surely HaShem is in this place, and I, I did not know it!" 17

The rabbis wrote extensively about this text's many curiosities. For instance: Why does the "certain place" where Jacob stopped go unnamed? Why are the angels going up and down the ladder rather than down and up? And finally, perhaps most importantly: how could Jacob have gone to sleep in this godly place? How could it not have been obvious to Jacob that the ground upon which he lay down was sacred ground?

The Chassidic Master Yaakov Yosef of Polnoye, a student of the Baal Shem Tov, extended that question to its natural, logical conclusion. One must believe, Yaakov Yosef taught, that m'lo chol ha'aretz k'vodo, that "the whole world is filled with God's presence"; and, as we learn from the mystical work Tikkunei Zohar, Yaakov Yosef taught, that "there is no place empty of God." In light of that understanding, how and where could we ever go to sleep? There is no place devoid of God's presence. The work of the spirit is to awaken to that understanding. As we prepared our hearts for Thanksqiving a few weeks ago - drawing attention, as we do every year, to the partial experiences of our lives we call our blessings - the words of Albert Einstein suggest themselves: "There are only two ways to live your life. One is as though nothing is a miracle. The other is as though everything is."

#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

One of Webster's four definitions for the word 'Perspective' is, "A mental picture of the relative importance of things." Not only in our community, but in the broader sense as well, we have had two recent examples of perspective.

On Friday night, October 26th, we were joined at PCS for Shabbos services and dinner by Lieutenant Nir, of the Israeli Defense Forces as part of the IDF's annual U.S. visit. During his remarks, the Lieutenant tried to convey a feeling that as Americans, or as American Jews, we think we fully understand, but in reality only can understand in part. A very timely discussion to have, given events that would soon unfold.

As Americans, between the conclusion of the Civil War and the awful day of September 11, 2001, any acts of war in which the U.S. was involved were always on someone else's soil. As much as we might attempt to completely understand truly "defending our homeland," we cannot understand the thoughts and feelings that are ingrained since birth in an Israeli citizen, particularly a soldier.

During dinner, a longtime PCS congregant and former IDF soldier himself, passionately and directly put the Lieutenant's thoughts into a more localized context for everyone to more easily understand. "To get up every morning wondering whether today is the day you will need to defend your country, your town, your block or your home possibly with your very life." We pray for Lieutenant Nir's safety during these days.

Just three days later in the tri-state area, Hurricane Sandy would also remind us of perspective. Seeing the pictures of the catastrophic destruction and damage to familiar areas such as Long Island, Queens, the Rockaways, Staten Island and the Jersey Shore, would also cause us to reflect on thoughts and feelings that we all too often simply take for granted, such as everyday security and well being. Most of us experienced a week or so of downed trees and area power lines, no electricity, no heat, hot water, internet or cable. Juxtaposed against loss of life in the aforementioned areas, or in other cases the loss of homes and all personal possessions, our area made it through the storm relatively well, B"H.

As we enter a season of holidays, whose core significance is giving thanks for our blessings and the recognition, understanding and celebrations of miracles and renewal, it is important at this troubling time for so many, that we keep in mind those small everyday blessings that we often overlook [while looking past them to bigger goals and more lofty aspirations].

During this upcoming season of thanks and miracles, let's attempt to find appreciation in those aspects of life that all of us so often simply take for granted. This year in particular, with all that we've recently witnessed, let us try and be more mindful of expressing our love, affection and appreciation for family and friends, for our health, as well as for our home and community. To everyone, a holiday season filled with only good health, joy, peace, contentment and happiness.

Be safe and enjoy all of Hashem's blessings in these days ahead. A Happy Chanukah to everyone.

#### **HEBREW SCHOOL HAPPENINGS**

The week before Hurricane Sandy hit the northeast, several of the PCS teachers and I went to the Museum of Jewish Heritage in Battery Park in lower Manhattan for an educator's conference. The topic of discussion was *The Hidden Children of the Holocaust*. Several case studies were presented and it was a very informative presentation. We were delighted to learn that our participation in this conference provided entrance to the museum. Rather than return home, we all agreed that it would be worthwhile (and fun) to explore the museum and view the exhibitions and collections. What an incredible experience. The main floors of the museum are a living memorial to those who perished in the Holocaust. It started with Jewish life a century ago, then the war against the Jews, and finally Jewish renewal. There were artifacts, photographs, and historical footage.

We also took advantage of the opportunity to visit two special exhibits: The first on Emma Lazarus with a spectacular view of the Statue of Liberty, and the second on the history of the song "Hava Nagila." We did not leave the museum until after 5 pm. We took a brief stroll on the promenade along the waterfront and had a light dinner in the city. It was a wonderful day for all of us. It was not only an educational afternoon, but it brought the teaching staff together and strengthened our connections to one another.

It was heartbreaking to find out the next week that Hurricane Sandy had caused massive amounts of water to wash over the promenade where we had just walked.

We all felt the impact of the double dose of extreme weather that nature delivered to Westchester and throughout the tri-state area—first the chaos from Hurricane Sandy followed days later by a nor easter that deposited more than half a foot of snow in our area. Trees were down, cables and wires down, roads were blocked, homes and property were damaged. It was shocking how quickly it got dark and cold. We are finally starting to recover from the feeling of disjointedness, displacement and disorientation.

For days the first thing we asked each other was, "Do you have power?" For some the answer was yes, as they were either lucky enough not to have lost power or had learned from last year's storm and invested in a generator. For others it took up to two weeks to have the heat, light, phones and cable restored. But, as I listened to some harrowing experiences, and in some cases true horror stories, it occurred to me that none of us actually lost "power." We did lose electricity and along with it phone and cable but we did not lose "power." There was great power in the strength of the community; the outreach of neighbors and the local businesses. Friends opened up their homes to those who were in the dark, local health clubs and spas opened their doors to residents offering the comfort of a hot shower at their facilities; PCS invited congregants to come in for light and warmth, and matched up those without heat to stay with those who did.

As we emerge from these dark and cold days, it feels appropriate that we will soon be celebrating Chanukah, the "Festival of Lights." Maybe we should ruminate on the blessing of our community and the power we derive from one another as we light a candle each night of Chanukah.

On Friday, I will be getting on a bus. I am not sure where this bus will be going, but I know when I get there, I will find a mess - a tragic mess. By Friday, the water will be gone, but the aftermath of its powerful destruction will remain. We are prepared to walk up 14 flights of dark stairs to check on the elderly who are trapped without elevator service, and possibly without heat. We will bring each of them a meal, perhaps an extra blanket and a few minutes of conversation; for not only are they cold and hungry, but also, they are alone. We will become their support systems, for they are now isolated from their community.

Hurricane Sandy has come and gone. In Westchester, our lives are finally getting back to normal. We still see a few maintenance crews working to remove the last of the fallen trees and we watch the last Con Edison trucks leave. We now have time to reflect on how we managed the weeks without power. In times of difficulty, we seek out community. It might have been a community of neighbors sharing refrigerator space, or an on-line community sharing information and strategies. And we need to remember that our synagogue, Pleasantville Community Synagogue, reached out to us. We all received emails, offering a warm place to spend an afternoon, or a place to charge our necessary devices. We had lunch after Saturday Shabbat services and checked in with one another. We felt the comfort and security of this community.

PCS proved to be our community in time of great need. But we need to develop this community in times of calm. We should be meeting one another at Friday night Shabbat dinners, at the Progressive Dinner, at Monday evening yoga. It is important for us to know one another, so that in both times of need and in times of calm, we are not alone, we have one another, we have our community.

The festivities will take place during class, from 11 am to 1 pm.


