Even though I am thoroughly enjoying myself, this is not a place for me. Miriam would love for Eve-Marie and me to

buy a place nearby, but I cannot do it. There is wonderful history in these mountains, and I love reading about it, but it isn't my history. It intrigues me, moves me, but doesn't resonate with my soul. I look forward to returning to Westchester and celebrating the high holidays with all of you.

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UNDER ONE ROOF



Under One Roof, the collaborative charitable effort by the Upper Westchester Muslim Society and PCS, successfully completed its first joint effort. Our sponsored food drive on behalf of Hope's Door, the local women's shelter, and the Katonah Community Center, a food pantry for the poor, netted over 350 pounds and \$1000 worth of donated food. Our next project will culminate on December 3, 2011, when our two communities will share a meal at the mosque in Thornwood and raise money for two noble causes. First, we will be raising money for Birthday Angels which provides birthday parties for orphaned and destitute children in Israel who otherwise would not have the funds or the means to celebrate their birth. Every child deserves a party and it is within our power to provide one for those who otherwise would go without. As well, we are supporting the remarkable and heroic work of Dr. Hawa Abdi in Somalia, who transformed her family farm into a refugee camp for battered women and children who are victims of religious and factional violence between competing clans of marauding zealots. She provides food, water, shelter, schooling and medical attention to over 15,000 people on a continuing basis and is reliant upon outside donations to sustain her work. Dr. Abdi has been named Woman of the Year, has been cited by Secretary of State Hilary Clinton and been the focus of an article by Nicholas Kristoff in the New York Times.

Suggested price for the meal, which will be prepared by members of UWMS and PCS, is only \$15. (Feel free to contribute more!) Children under 10 eat free. We hope you can all come. It's an opportunity to mingle, learn, eat and have fun while making a huge difference in the lives of children in Somalia and Israel. Please RSVP to Michael Gold at the below email address. The world is conditioned to believe that our two communities can do nothing more than kill each other. A YOUNG MAN EMBRACES HIS JUDAISM

Ken Marolda celebrated his Bar Mitzvah this past spring at PCS... at the age of eighteen. We're delighted to welcome Ken and his family to PCS. Here is his story.

I was born on the 9th of April, 1993 to a Jewish mother and a Roman Catholic father. In July of that year, I was baptized "Kenneth Gerard", my first name having been taken from my deceased maternal grandfather, and my middle name being taken from my still-living paternal grandfather. It was expected I would be Catholic.

The duration of my childhood seemed like a battleground between the two religions, with me basically being raised to view Judaism and Christianity with the same skepticism as most Americans view Roman Paganism, Islam, Shinto and Hinduism - just as two other factions on the world's list of theories on God. Third grade passed and no Confirmation occurred. Then I turned 13, and no Bar Mitzvah took place. It wasn't until I took a course on the Holocaust and began climbing the branches of my family tree that I took an interest in Judaism.

Through my Holocaust course at Pace University, I gained a basic knowledge of Judaic history, for the course outlines the entire history of the Jewish people with the intent of proving that persecution has always been a plague for Jews, and that we have a responsibility to learn from it and be more tolerant towards others. This concept of tolerance is one that my mind has taken strongly to wrapping itself around, for it has led me to the understanding that tolerance is not just a notion of religious leniency, but can be applied to any situation in which different values conflict. To be understanding and respectful of a person's moral and religious choices and be sympathetic to the influence those morals have on their lives: that is true tolerance.

I also learned from this course how the Jewish people survived two thousand years without a homeland, how a common language and culture has acted as glue to hold these extraordinary people together through plagues, persecution and exile. The commitment many Jews showed to their religion during the Holocaust astonished me, as I learned how many chose to proudly die as Jews rather than convert or hide as gentiles.

By the age of 17, I decided I wanted to formally become a part of this population of people, and I made the decision that I wanted to have a Bar Mitzvah. My parents, who strongly supported this idea, suggested that I contact Pleasantville Community Synagogue because they had been to a Bar Mitzvah there a few months earlier and felt that out of all the other synagogues they'd attended, this one seemed to run most parallel to my aspirations. Through studying with Rabbi Mark and PCS, I discovered a religion that is as engaging intellectually as it is spiritually fulfilling.

What you have to understand is that for me, this was not only about finding a relationship with God. Don't get me wrong, a connection with Him was a part of this; but a more substantial source of motivation stemmed from a deep desire to relieve an internal sense of conflict within me. Finding an internal balance between the Polish Hebrew side of me and the Italian Gentile side of me has always been a struggle. I wanted to be able to share a cultural connection with my Jewish family and ancestors while still maintaining a bond to my paternal Italian roots. Lessons learned from Rabbi Mark, the Torah, and my observations of Judaic culture have helped me find peace within myself and view the world around me in a more peaceful way. This is a concept I like to refer to as "Pax Judaica", or Jewish Peace, the Peace I have found through Judaism.

For my community service project, I tutored a younger student in Hebrew. After she improved in her reading and writing Hebrew, I heard about the National Library Initiative, a program of Jewish Women International (www.jwi.org) and I became a Library Ambassador.

The NLI creates children's libraries in domestic violence shelters all over the country, and these libraries offer kids and their moms a safe and peaceful space for reading and learning.

The results can be measured by the number of books on library shelves, the thousands of kids who use them, and the volunteers who give these kids a chance and make a true difference.

A Library Ambassador helps build the libraries with books, and I hope you will help me with this project by donating a children's book(s). The books must be new - JWI believes that every child, no matter what their circumstances, deserves the opportunity to receive and read brand new books – and if you would like to make a donation, please drop off your books at PCS.

What this project means to me is that I am giving kids who wouldn't ordinarily get the chance to read or learn through books an opportunity to do so. I believe that for these children in the shelters, it is wonderful enough to go from no books in their own homes to a whole library of books they can read whenever they want, but it is even better if they read a book that gives them hope and confidence that their lives will be okay.

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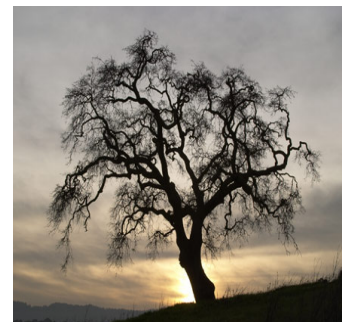

Though it may seem early, planning for the coming Yamim Noraim requires much advance preparation.

Following is a form to indicate your interest and mail/email/fax (769-1795) it to the synagogue office as soon as possible so that we may begin scheduling the honors that require it.

Individual Honors: English reading and Torah honors (holding, lifting or dressing the scrolls) are scheduled in advance of services. Please enter the name of each adult in your family with appropriate preferences. In consideration of your family's own High Holiday practices, you are also invited to enter a preferred day and time.

Teen Participation: We invite all of our teens - as well as those who will be celebrating their bar/bat mitzvah in the coming year - to lead the community in the chanting of Ashrei during the Torah service on the first day of Rosh Hashana. It would be appreciated if those of you whose children will be participating in Ashrei would confirm this honor on the form as well.

Celebratory Group Aliyot: We will be calling to the bimah lay leaders and volunteers for celebratory group aliyot on the first day of Rosh Hashana. All current members - men and women - who would customarily be eligible for an aliyah are welcome to participate. These are not scheduled in advance.

Torah Reading Honors: Reading from the Torah will be scheduled separately.
